THE ROOTS OF THE GARDEN THE TOP HOURS AWARD



Chris File

With 316 hours this year, Chris started volunteering in 2012 in the Orchid Center, an easy fit for this Orchid Specialist whose love of these plants came from her mother who regularly won blue ribbons for her orchids and had "the greenest thumb of anyone I've ever known," Chris says. She added the docent role in 2018 and is one of our go-to docents for Orchid Center tours. She has helped on numerous docent committees, and in addition to all this, she has been a tremendous help to the staff in GardenHouse, doing weekly shifts in the accounting office. A Centennial since 2013, a six-time Bicentennial, and a Volunteer of the Month in both 2013 and 2021, Chris this year earns her fourth Roots award, having received the distinction in 2019, 2022 and 2023.

Marj Leinbaugh

With 377 hours, Marj began volunteering in 2009 after attending a Garden Maintenance training and has been digging in the dirt ever since. She helped in a few of the outdoor areas, but quickly found a home in the Children's Garden, and then added a second day in Storza Woods. More recently, she has also found a place in the Orchid Center, helping the staff with weeding, clean up, pest management, and anything else the staff needs, including helping to set up this year's Orchid Daze Exhibition. She was a Volunteer of the Month in 2017 and 2024, a 12-time Centennial Club member, and has four years of giving over 200 hours. The staff in the Orchid Center says her enthusiasm and excitement are contagious, and she is a real force of positivity and motivation.

This is her first Roots Award.

Charlotte Miller

With 540 hours this year, Charlotte volunteers for nearly every staff person in every department. Beyond her usual roles as a docent, GEM volunteer, Discovery volunteer, class assistant, amphibian and greenhouse volunteer, she also helps with events from the membership and development department, like the Garden of Eden Ball, and signs up for other events, festivals, programs, and one-time opportunities. Starting as a volunteer in 2013, she has made Centennial Club every year and 200+ hours since 2014.

She is a two-time Volunteer of the Month, in 2015 and 2018, and was the Garden's Volunteer of the Year in 2018. Described as invaluable, passionate, engaging and knowledgeable, this year Charlotte is earning her tenth consecutive Roots Award.

Janet Cantrelle

With a total of 605 hours, Janet began volunteering in April 2016 in the Discovery and Garden Maintenance roles and also helped with the Chihuly glass cleaning that summer. She now spends her time in the Woodlands for GEM duty and chatting with visitors on the Tree ID and Amphibian Discovery Stations. She also leads tours as a docent, tends to plants and displays in the Orchid Center and even helps with exhibit installs in that space. She is a regular Centennial, a 200+ hour volunteer since 2017, a Root of the Garden the past seven years, a Volunteer of the Month in both 2017 and 2021, and the Garden's Volunteer of the Year for 2021. With the top hours in the volunteer program last year, Janet is to be congratulated for earning her eighth Roots Award.



Docent Corner

What's on the mind of the outgoing and incoming Docent Chairs



Flexibility in Giving Tours By Heather Tangren, 2024 Docent Co-Chair

The Garden's Drop-In Tours are primarily in the control of the individual docent. Although we are well versed about the past, present and future history of the Garden through our training and monthly Docent Updates, docents also share with guests their knowledge and love of what's growing in the Garden and, let's face it, there are certain months when that becomes challenging due to the Garden's being in transition.

April would be one of those months. Orchid Daze and Atlanta Blooms events close in early April. The winter annuals change over to summer annuals. The summer exhibit is being installed and many pathways are cordoned off and need to be avoided. This is when I ask myself where is the WOW and COLOR that the majority of our visitors request? I have come to realize that this offers the opportunity to promote areas of the Garden that often get missed on regular tours but are also magnificent and show off beautifully. Spending more time in the Rose

Garden, the Rock Garden, the Conservation Garden and the Perennial Garden offers a different tour but has worked well for me in the past and my tour visitors have been delighted.

October would be the other "transition" month with the summer exhibit being dismantled, the summer annuals being changed over to winter annuals and the massive exhibit install for Garden Lights Holiday Nights occurring. Where did my tours take me in October? Of course there were the thousands of pumpkins and hundreds of scarecrows that visitors love and want to see. But this past October I thought it might be nice to promote our Fuqua Conservatory and spend more time pointing out certain plants in the Tropical Rotunda, The Desert House, the Orangerie and the orchid conservatories, so that's what I did. I learn something new each time I go there, and I am certain our visitors do too.

Every year there is more and more interest to share in our Garden and it is our job to help visitors enjoy themselves so much that they want to return again and again, no matter what is in season.



Springtime in the GardenBy Hayes Doane, 2025 Docent Chair

Late winter and early spring are a special, quiet garden time for us here in Georgia. When I wander through the Garden in January and February, one plant I always enjoy spotting is Hellebore, sometimes known as Christmas Rose or Lenten Rose. These lovely, relatively compact members of the Ranunculaceae family bloom when most of our flowering plants are resting up for later in the year, and they boast as much variation in color as our beloved camellias.

We're so fortunate that Hellebore enjoy our mild winters and, once established, can spread to create a lovely ground cover, though judicious thinning will probably be needed at some point. They give us beautiful pops of purple, pink, white, yellow, red and green at a time when our gardens tend to be fairly muted. *Hellebore orientalis*, with its purple-pink flowers, is readily available in garden centers and nurseries and makes a lovely addition to any shady or sun-dappled spot in your garden.

One of my favorite aspects of this plant is the rich mythology surrounding it. It is, you may know, toxic to people and animals and can also cause skin irritation when handled. However it was once considered a "cure" for various maladies during ancient and medieval times and was thought to be a valuable tool in balancing the body's "humours" and relieving "melancholy distress." While that treatment is best left in the past, I certainly feel a little lift of my spirits whenever I encounter this charming plant. If you are interested, there is a fascinating blog post called *Hellebore: the History of a Toxic Medicinal 'Remedy'* published December 6, 2023 and available from *A Place Between the Trees*, a fantastic resource written and maintained by the Whitworth Visitor's Team of Manchester's Whitworth Park.

I hope to see you soon in the Garden!

This last year was incredibly fulfilling and successful for the Garden. As expected, Alice in Wonderland and Mosaiculture, International delivered in a big way with an 18% increase in attendance over 2023. This very special exhibition has a unique draw to bring in people from all walks of life.

Now 2025 is underway and I wanted to share what's ahead with our upcoming exhibitions. The first of the year, as always, was **Orchid Daze**, which just wrapped up its 22nd year! This year we departed from showcasing local artists and instead used a multitude of spheres that were designed to mirror the beauty of the orchids. The team worked hard to find shiny and highly reflective spheres that could be stacked on armatures to create those amorphous shapes draped in colorful orchids. It was a daring exhibition that was bold, colorful and surprising. People seemed to love it!



Atlanta Blooms is always a crowd pleaser and this year has been no different with brilliant and changing displays of tulips, daffodils and other bulbs. It was a challenging year for the bulb growers in Holland due to an enormous amount of rain. Amanda and her team learned to be flexible as many of the bulbs we carefully selected were unavailable due to crop failure. Our colleagues in Holland came through for us with replacement bulbs so the show should be stunning, but it was challenging for our design team. It's becoming so much more commonplace for the effects of climate change to impact our lives at the Garden: this is an example of that. I hope you noticed a new display of species tulips under the crepe myrtle alee, a more permanent bulb display that will bring beauty for years to come. Species tulips are typically long lived and don't have to be treated as annuals. They are small, beautiful and have a special charm that I have always loved.

Alice returns in early May of 2025, and we believe that she will deliver another blockbuster season for us. But, as many of you know, we always have a new twist or surprise up our sleeves. We have the amazing opportunity to be the first Garden to premier Patrick Shearn and Poetic Kinetics' new **Enchanted Trees**. In early May, ten sizeable and colorful sculptural trees will be installed throughout the Garden. Patrick was so enchanted by our Garden when he was here to install his Dream Flora piece in 2022 that he was inspired to make his own trees from metal and dichroic glass and plastic. All of the trees will reflect light off of their colorful leaves sending prisms of colors to reflect off of people, plants and objects around them. Imagine visitors standing in that reflected light with colorful rainbows on their clothes! It will be a delightful exhibition and a perfect pairing with the plant-focused Alice in Wonderland show.

I was fortunate to travel to Colorado Springs in December to see Patrick's **Enchanted Trees** which were standing in the snow under groves of ponderosa pines. It was just magical to see his version of a quaking aspen, flowering dogwood and Japanese maples. They truly were enchanting and when the wind blows, their leaves will flutter or spin like tops.

As always, we are grateful for the time and service each of you provides to the Garden. I love running into you in the Garden and seeing so many of you at our Thanks for Giving Luncheon which has always been one of my favorite events of the year!
